Student's charity walks

A student has helped a charity celebrate its 25th birthday by raising more than £1,000.

Grace Hanley (13) committed to walking an additional 100 miles in May by

changing her daily routine, refusing the 3-mile lift to and from school and completing extra-long dog walks.

Father Phil said her initial aim was to raise £300 and complete the challenge over the month but it was achieved by the 18th, with Grimsby charity Foresight benefitting.

"My wife Rachel and I are extremely proud of her," he said.

"This fundraising was an idea Grace came up with and she chose to support Foresight in Grimsby.



"She has witnessed the amazing work they do to allow their beneficiaries to lead a life that some could take for granted.

"It just so happened the fundraising fell in with the charity's 25th anniversary so it was wonderful timing."

Mr Hanley is a trustee of the Grimsby charity and he said it was "heart-warming" the Academy was recognising Grace's achievement.

Principal Nigel Whittle congratulated Grace.

Matilda tickets

The last few tickets remain for our production of the West End smash hit Matilda the Musical.

Our first big production in years will be performed by students at the Cleethorpes Parkway Cinema and Theatre next Wednesday (26th June) and Thursday.

It follows the creation of a new Performing Arts department at the school, led by Co-Director of Arts Gemma Carter.

"We held auditions for the roles in September and rehearsals started shortly after," she said. "They're going really well. We visited the Parkway and the students were so excited to see the theatre space. It has all made it seem very real."

The set will arrive and be constructed on Tuesday with a full dress and technical rehearsal the following day ahead of the public shows.

"We are all very excited," said Gemma. "The students have been absolutely fantastic to work with, showing a real dedication to learning their lines.

"We promise the audience an energetic, dynamic, exciting, family friendly show with lots of fun.

"It is part of our ambition to build Performing Arts at the Academy to be the best in the area and, hopefully, this is just the start."

The lead role will be played by 11-year-old Sophie High. "I'm really excited," she said.

"It's the first time I will have been on stage acting and singing, though I have been dancing for with CLS Dance Studio for eight years.

"I just want it to go really well and everyone who comes and watches has some fun. "It is stressful but I'm sure it will be worth it.

"We're having great fun in rehearsals and I can't wait for people to see it."

She was given the role after a tough audition.

"There was a lot of competition and eight got through to the final round. I found out when the cast list was put up and was thrilled to find out I was going to be Matilda."

Meet the author

We are very excited and proud to share that Aidan Wright, in Year 10, has released his first novel! It is entitled "The Northern Travels" and is the first book in a fantasy four-part series called "The Legends of Ace Ford".

Aidan's dream job is to be an author and he has taken the leap. Aidan spent seven months writing "The Northern Travels", when he was just 13. One year on, he has already finished writing the second book in the series, entitled "The Grey Mountains", and isn't long off finishing the third, "The Goblin's Sea".

The story follows the adventures of Ace Ford and his four companions, Libbie, Jim, Becky and Austin, who are all orphans in a San Diego orphanage. The five head to the beach on a typical summer's day, only to have their entire lives flipped upside down. They wake up in a peculiar kingdom, only to discover that it is controlled by a mysterious, wicked empire, ruled by an evil god. Aidan's first novel is available to buy from all major booksellers under his pen name A.T. Wright and it is suitable for all ages.

To celebrate this amazing achievement, we organised for Aidan to hold a workshop, held in our Library, with some of our year 7 pupils who also love reading. Aidan began by reading aloud a couple of the chapters from his book. The Year 7 pupils then took pen to paper and drew a picture depicting what they thought one of the scenes and the characters from the book would look like. The workshop concluded with Aidan answering questions about his journey to become a published author.

Aidan has plans to hold similar workshops at local primary schools.


