


## **EFL Utilita Girls Cup**

# **Bletchley Park trip**

On Monday 18 November some of our Year 10 students visited Bletchley Park, the home of codebreaking in the Second World War.

During the visit students were shown around the grounds of the Park by knowledgeable staff. They got to see sights such as the gates where the main entrance once stood, the mansion where the codebreaking first started, and the huts used when the staff grew to such a number that the mansion could no longer house them all. They also looked in the garages which contained cars, motorbikes and an ambulance that would have been used at the time.

Students ended their tour at the veterans' wall, where past codebreakers have their names on a brick. Students had the opportunity to explore the

grounds in small groups to take a closer look at exhibits such as Alan Turing's office, which contained his mug, chained to a radiator to ensure no-one else could use it. They also took part in a code-breaking session led by Bletchley staff, where they learnt some of the different techniques used in the war. Students did an amazing job of cracking the codes. During this session they



were shown how the Enigma machine works, a genuine artefact used during the war at Bletchley Park to decode messages sent by the enemy regarding their plans. There was a demonstration of how the machine works, and we got to understand the huge number of ways in which it could be set up. Some students even got to have a go at using this machine to encode and decode a message.

This was a great day, enjoyed by staff and students alike, where we learnt plenty about the codebreaking efforts that contributed to the end of WW2.
